PURPOSE OF ITEM: To provide the funding recommendations to the Board of County Commissioners

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: To fund the SCFD fudging allocation for 2017-18 as requested by the Adams County Cultural Council

BACKGROUND:

SCFD has distributed funds from a 1/10 of 1% sales and use tax to qualified cultural organizations throughout the seven-county Denver, Colorado metropolitan area. The funds support cultural facilities whose primary purpose is to enlighten and entertain the public through the production, presentation, exhibition, advancement and preservation of art, music, theatre, dance, zoology, betony, natural history and cultural history.

ACCC interviews and evalutes the qualified organizations each year to provide the recommendations to the Board of County Commissioners on how to distribute the 2017-18 SCFD allocation. The SCFD district board provided Adams County with \$1,111,747.52 for the 2017-18 funding allocation. ACCC provided funding to 104 projects, 4 visual art projects, and fund 19 general operating support organizations within Adams County.

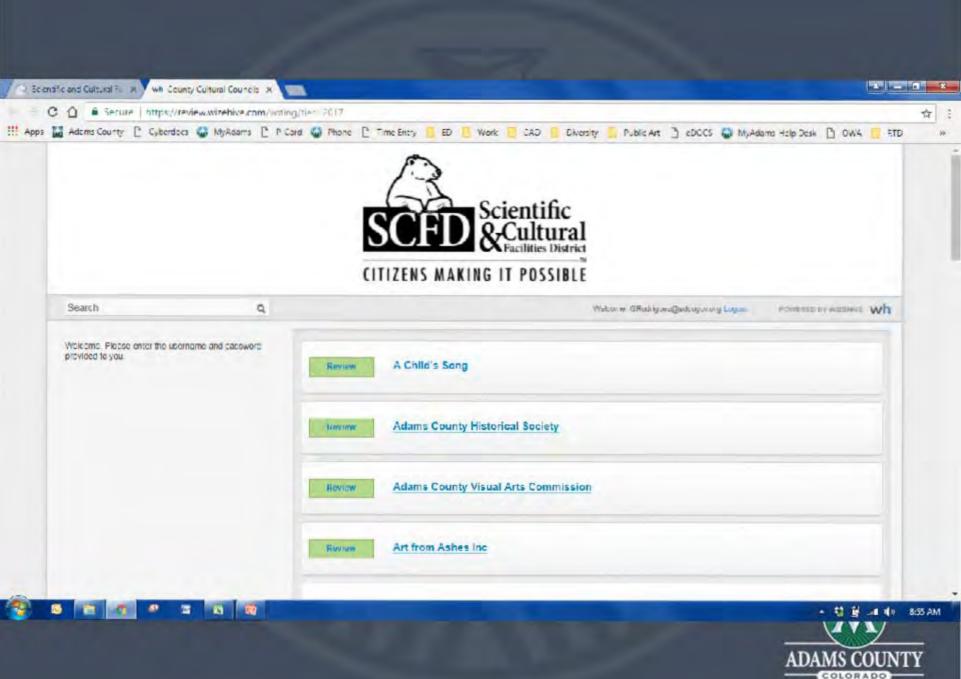

Since 1989, Scientific and Cultural Facilities District (SCFD) has distributed funds from a 1/10 of 1% sales and use tax to cultural facilities throughout the seven-county Denver, Colorado metropolitan area (Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Broomfield, Denver, Douglas, and Jefferson counties). The funds support cultural facilities whose primary purpose is for enlightening and entertaining the public through the production, presentation, exhibition, advancement or preservation of visual arts, performing arts, cultural history, natural history, or natural sciences.

Part of the SCFD grant process understands that your organization cannot be 100% funded by SCFD. You are able to raise money and support yourself by other means as well. 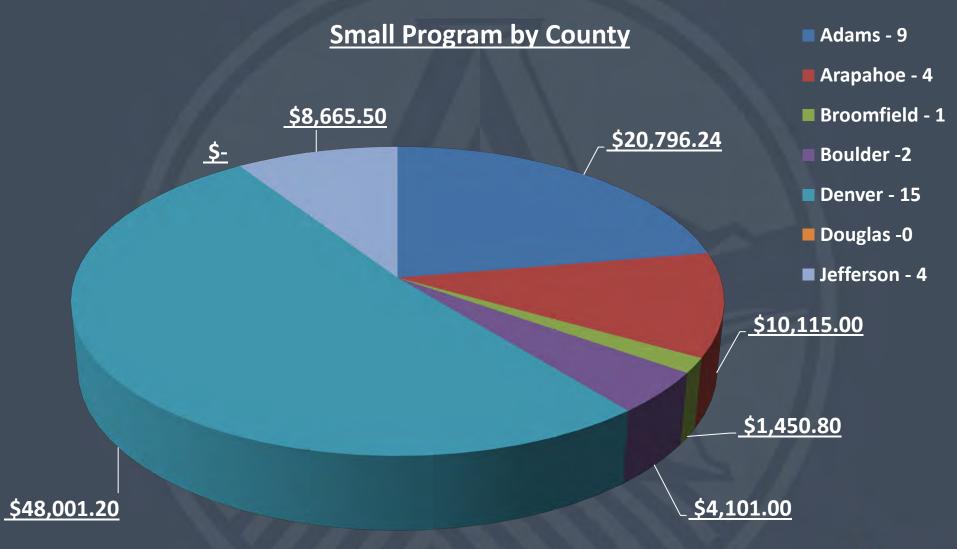

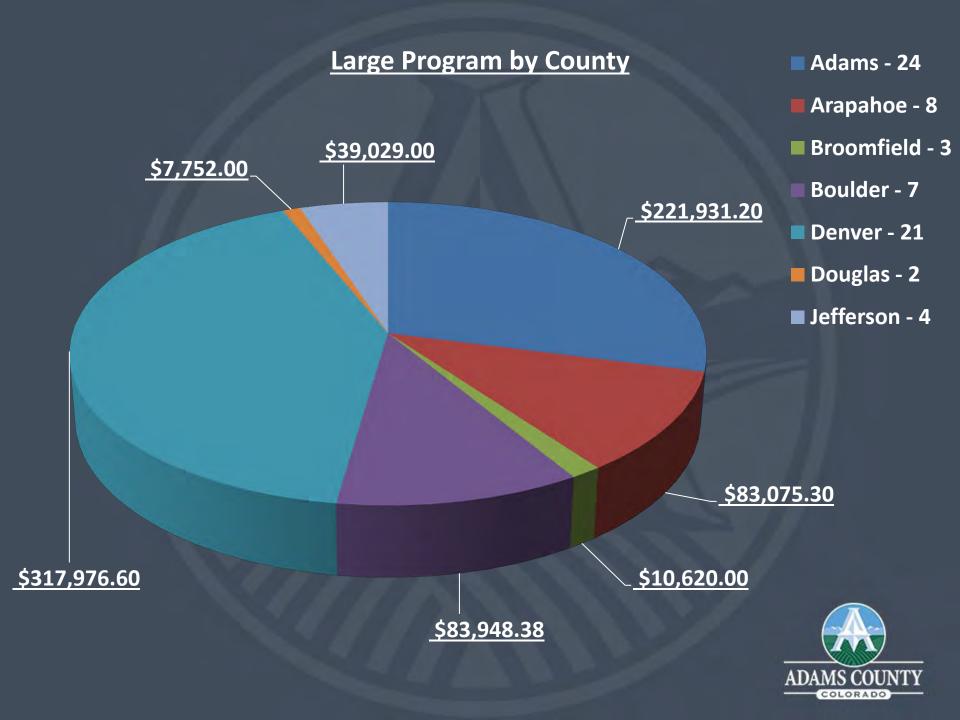

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Informational/general feedback on fiscally constrained regional transportation plan projects and general direction on policy areas for ADCOG process.

BACKGROUND:

The purpose of the monthly meetings is to update the board and receive their direction on reprioritizing the regional transportation projects and key issues for the DRCOG TIP hybrid allocation process.

The county and its cities (ADCOG) have an already-established process in place to prioritize regional transportation needs ahead of DRCOG's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) 'call for projects' and funding updates to CDOT's State Transportation Improvement Plan (STIP). The purpose behind this effort is for the county and its cities to collectively advocate for investment in these priorities from CDOT, DRCOG, and other agencies, as applicable.

Because DRCOG is considering a hybrid regional-subregional model for the 2020-2023 TIP process at the same time ADCOG is reprioritizaing its regional projects, the county has the opportunity to help shape regional policy discussions for the TIP allocation process.

The study sessions are planned to occur prior to the monthly ADCOG functions. This will help focus discussion at the breakfast on our regional priorities and preparing our DRCOG elected officials for the key discussions taking place about the TIP hybrid process.

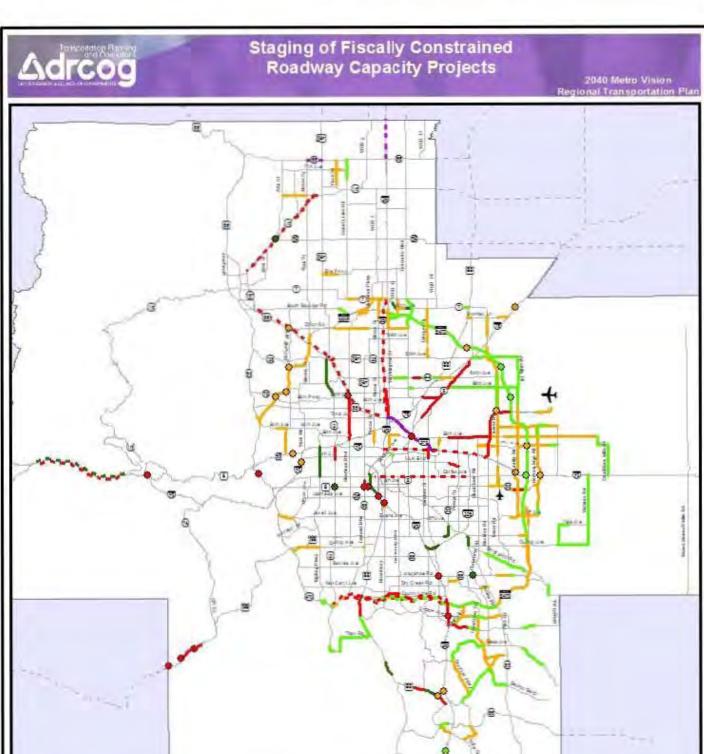

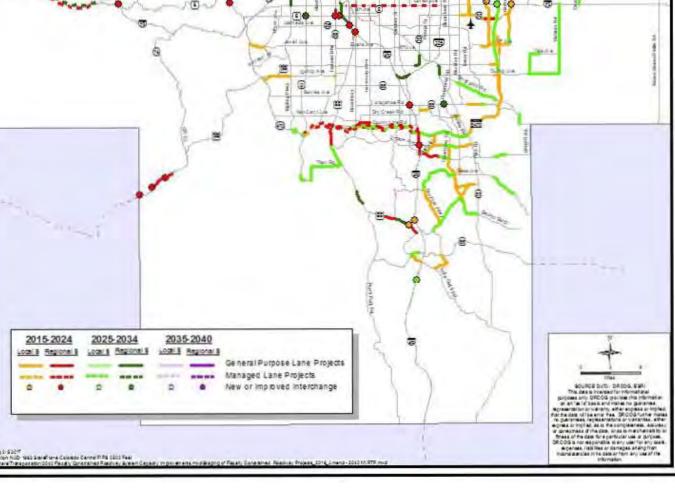

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Permit reallocation of budgeted amounts with the General Fund to allow two small projects at the Adams County Detention Facility to proceed into construction.

BACKGROUND:

On December 29, 2016, a Purchase Order was issued to Roche Constructors, Inc. to perform multiple small projects budgeted within the General Fund as follows:

- Kitchen Floor Refinishing
- F-Module Plumbing Access
- A/E Chase Ductwork Modification
- Booking Floor Replacement (cancelled at the request of the Sheriff's Office)

Roche Constructors, Inc. sought competitive pricing from the subcontractor community for all scopes of work with the exception of the cancelled project. For all three remaining projects, the lowest qualified bids were higher than the allocated budget. The Sheriff's Office, in collaboration with the Facility Operation Department, propose to reallocate the entire budget amount of \$41,000 from 'A/E Chase Ductwork Modification' to the remaining two projects as follows:

- Kitchen Floor Refinishing \$65,000 (budget) \$75,456 (proposal) \$11,000 (reallocation)
- F-Module Plumbing Access \$25,000 (budget) \$53,491 (proposal) \$30,000 (reallocation)

Quality: Vendor warrants that the goods delivered hereunder will conform to the description stated in this Order and that the goods will be merchantable, of good workmanship and materials, and free from defects. These warranties shall survive inspection, testing and/or acceptance of the goods. At County's option, and without prejudice to any other rights County may have, Vendor shall remedy any defective goods or reimburse County for its costs for remedying or replacing defective goods.

Packing Charges: No charges will be allowed for transportation, boxing, crating or other packaging unless set forth in writing in this Order.

Terms of Payment: Payment in full by County shall be made within thirty (30) days after receipt of invoice from Vendor.

Tax Exempt: County is a tax–exempt government entity, a body politic and corporate. No sales, use or excise taxes shall be included in or added to the prices of materials or goods on this Order. County's tax exempt number is 98–03569.

Appropriation Clause: The payment of County's obligation hereunder in fiscal years subsequent to the current year are contingent upon funds for this Order being appropriated and budgeted. If funds for this Order are not appropriated and budgeted in the year subsequent to the fiscal year of issuance of this Order, the County may terminate this Order. County's fiscal year is the calendar year. Termination under this provision shall not result in any penalty being imposed against County.

Cancellation for Cause: This Order is to be acknowledged properly, and the date of shipment shall be stated definitely in the acknowledgment by Vendor. In the event of Vendor's failure to deliver as and when specified, County reserves the right to cancel this Order, or any part thereof, without affect to its other rights, and Vendor agrees that County may return part or all of any shipment so made and may charge Vendor with any loss or expense sustained as a result of such failure to deliver.

Any alterations, changes, variations, or additional terms by Vendor are rejected unless expressly assented to in writing by County. Acceptance is expressly limited to the terms of this Order; any additional or different terms are of no force and effect and notification of objection to such additional terms is hereby given.

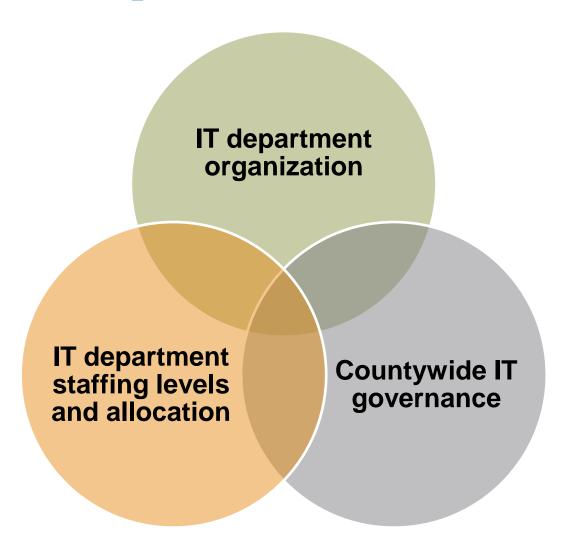

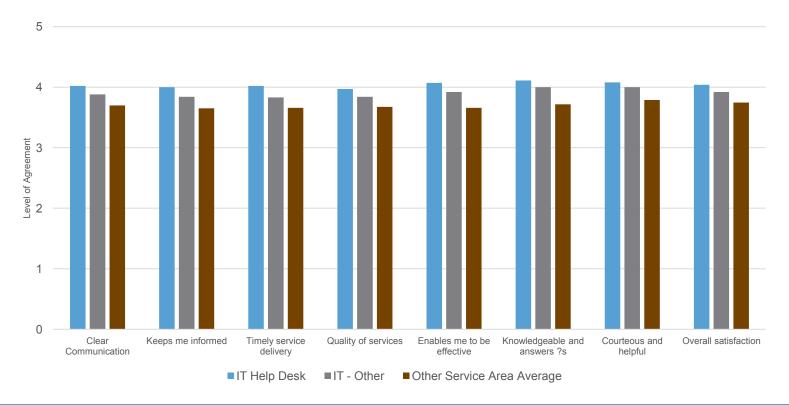

2016 COUNTY STAFF CUSTOMER SERVICE SURVEY SUMMARY RESULTS

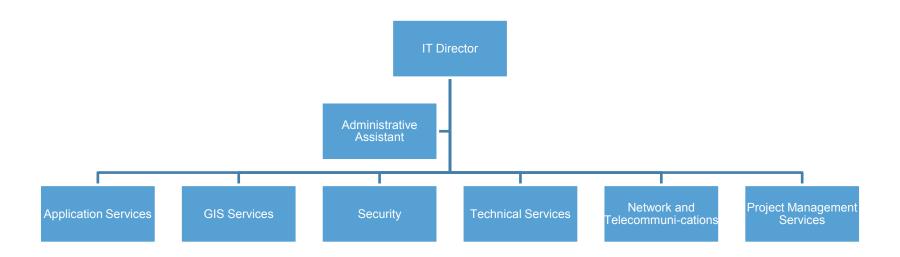

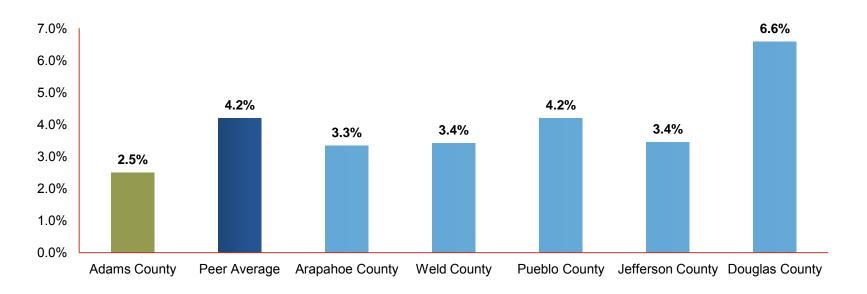
