ADAMS COUNTY, COLORADO THIRD ADDENDUM TO SERVICE AGREEMENT

RECITALS

WHEREAS, on June 1, 2011, the County entered into a Service Agreement with CBR Youth Connect to provide Home Based Intervention Services to families referred by Adams County Human Services Department (ACHSD) pursuant to the Colorado Family Preservation Act §§ 26-5-101, et seq., C.R.S. and in compliance with the state rules and County Plan, policies, and procedures and CDHS Volume VII 7.303, and,

WHEREAS, the term of the agreement expired on May 31, 2012, and,

WHEREAS, the County and the Contractor extended the Service Agreement through May 31, 2013, and,

WHEREAS, the term of the agreement expired on May 31, 2013, and was extended from June 1, 2013 through May 31, 2014, and,

WHEREAS, , the County and the Contractor mutually desire to extend the agreement from June 1, 2014 through May 31, 2015, and,

NOW, THEREFORE, for the consideration set forth herein, the sufficiency of which is mutually acknowledged by the parties, the County and the Contractor agree as follows:

- 1. The County shall reimburse the Contractor for the work provided under this Third Addendum in accordance with **Section IV of the Service Agreement**. Beginning June 1, 2014 through May 31, 2015, Adams County will pay Colorado Boys Ranch Foundation a sum not to exceed \$130,000.00. The monthly rate quoted in the Request for Application is \$1400.00 a month per case.
- 2. The term of the Service Agreement is extended through May 31, 2015.
- 3. The Service Agreement and this Third Addendum contain the entire understanding of the parties hereto and neither it, nor the rights and obligations hereunder, may be changed, modified, or waived except by an instrument in writing that is signed by both parties. Any terms, conditions, or provisions of the Service Agreement that are not amended or modified by this Third Addendum shall remain in full force and effect. In the event of any conflicts between the terms, conditions, or provisions of the Service Agreement and this Third Addendum, the terms, conditions, and provisions of this Third Addendum shall control.
- 4. The Recitals contained in this Third Addendum are incorporated into the body hereof an accurately reflect the intent and agreement of the parties.

- 5. This Third Addendum may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original and all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same agreement.
- 6. Nothing expressed or implied in this Third Addendum is intended or shall be construed to confer upon or to give to, any person other than the parties, any right, remedy, or claim under or by reason of this Third Addendum or any terms, conditions, or provisions hereof. All terms, conditions, and provisions in this Third Addendum by and on behalf of the County and the Contractor shall be for the sole and exclusive benefit of the County and the Contractor.
- 7. If any provision of this Third Addendum is determined to be unenforceable or invalid for any reason, the remainder of the Third Addendum shall remain in effect, unless otherwise terminated in accordance with the terms contained in the Service Agreement.
- 8. Each party represents and warrants that it has the power and ability to enter into this Third Addendum, to grant the rights granted herein, and to perform the duties and obligations herein described.

A. Agency Information

1. Provide a brief description of your agency, and / or organization including total staff size, number of years in operations, mission and history. CBR YouthConnect (CBR) is the operating entity of COLORADO BOYS RANCH FOUNDATION, an innovative 501 (c) (3) charitable organization providing hope and award-winning programs for over 10,000 children, youth and their families for more than 53 years. Mission: "To achieve excellence in providing troubled youth and families with the means to become hopeful and productive citizens." The total staff size is 25.

In August 2012, due to the economy, CBR discontinued its highly accredited and nationally recognized psychiatric residential treatment, education and vocational services on the La Junta, Colorado campus. This occurred despite multiple, aggregate studies over the past decade demonstrating a sustained success rate exceeding 89% three years post discharge.



CBR operates <u>Preventative Aftercare</u>, a statewide, home-based program serving child welfare, mental health and juvenile justice systems plus military installations. The program is designed to help keep families together and promote long term stability.

In addition, CBR operates successful community outreach programs: <u>Human-Animal Connection</u> and a <u>Military Families Initiative</u>. Combined, these programs served over 1200 children plus families the past four years. A newly developed <u>Character Development and Ethics Initiative</u> is also underway to address disturbing national trends in child and family functioning and related costs to society.

CBR YouthConnect, via its "Preventative Aftercare" (PAC) program, is an established, multi-year core service provider for Adams County as well as Denver, Jefferson, Broomfield, Arapahoe, Douglas, Otero, Crowley, Bent and DYC statewide. The "Preventative Aftercare" approach and CBR management system is well recognized and respected by each referral source for its responsiveness, performance and versatility.

B. Programs / Services to be provided, in the context of this RFA

1. In the specific service area your agency is proposing, what are the key concepts and strategies for program/services to be provided? In 2008, CBR YouthConnect selected a well-established and researched home-based service model to offer Colorado counties and Judicial districts. The model, Preventative Aftercare (PAC), was developed in 1993 by George Jr. Republic (founded in 1909). Preventative Aftercare services are provided by 80+ workers in 3 states (Ohio, Pennsylvania and Indiana) daily serving 700 youth and families and over 2400 each year. Through a license and service agreement, CBR YouthConnect provides Preventative Aftercare services to Colorado counties and judicial districts for the past five years. Formal evidence-based research was completed by Edinboro University of Pennsylvania. The findings demonstrate high program effectiveness.

Key concepts involve individual motivations, family dynamics and the acquiring social emotional skills to manage emotions, think through issues, develop concern for others and handle adversity.

PAC services are designed to promote family stability by taking the services to the client/family in their home, school, and community rather than expecting client/families to keep appointments at an office. PAC offers a flexible and customized approach highly adaptive to the specific needs and circumstances of each youth/family. PAC is designed to help parents with young children; prevention of out-of-home



- 1. How do you plan to coordinate services and reporting with Child Welfare Social Case Workers? At the direction of the CWSCW. All forms of communication are available -- when, where and how best fits the CWSCW. Our job is to meet all reasonable requirements. Communication and coordination with the CWSCW begins with the referral and extends through the duration of the case and beyond as needed. Reliability, communication, timely and accurate written reports and on-going problem solving are performance requirements for the Family Service Provider.
- 2. Will you provide other supportive services through collaborative agreements with other programs/providers? If so, define these services: As needed, specific service collaborations may occur related to language and cultural needs or customized assessments within the scope of work.
- 3. It is likely that you or your staff will be expected to testify on the witness stand during Court Hearings. Briefly describe your (their) experience and the qualifications that would qualify you as experts in child welfare or other fields. All PAC Family Service Providers understand the expectations of court involvement and the possibility of testifying. Each staff member has court experience and some have testified. Most staff members have master level degrees in social work, psychology or counseling. MSWs are recruited with specialty certificates such as: working with at-risk youth; with families; building community networking; and/or animal assisted practice. Exceptional individuals with BA degrees in human services plus two years or more relevant and referenced experience may be considered. As a general rule of thumb, PAC staff would qualify as experts in child welfare. However, based upon the legal and advocacy processes, each court case is subject to differing standards for "expert" status.

D. Report and Accounting Systems

- 1. ACHSD requires monthly reports with specific information. Briefly describe your methodology and ablility to track data and provide these reports on client progress. The organization is fully capable of providing, tracking and aggregating required data electronically or hard copy. The information is stored and secured in a master data base. A Case Service Plan is completed within 30 days of case origination. It is updated monthly and provided to the caseworker. In addition, the PAC Family Service Provider makes weekly contact with the caseworker via phone call, e-mails or in person. When needed, the PAC Family Service Provider attends staffings or partnering sessions with other involved agencies, attends court hearings and initiates contact with probation, mental health, public health or other providers in the case plan. Internally, CBR has a case documentation oversight plan involving supervisors and administrative oversight.
- 2. Describe the accounting system you utilize to provide fiduciary accountability. All accounting systems and practices meet general accounting standards and are completed by the corporate business office. All financial transactions and accounting processes are subject to annual independent financial audit and governing body oversight consistent with our non-profit incorporation.

- <u>Donor Support</u> -- The Preventative Aftercare program is able to leverage county dollars
 with private philanthropic support. COLORADO BOYS RANCH FOUNDATION has
 interested donors who contribute funds plus foundations and organizations who
 award grants specifically to the PAC program for "above-and-beyond" family resources
 such as music and art lessons, school supplies, athletic clothing and equipment and
 tickets and transporation costs for family activities and community events.
- <u>Animal Assisted Services</u> CBR operates various animal assisted programs that could be available to PAC families, groups and/or on an individual case basis. In the past four years, over 600 Denver metro area youth have been served from treatment centers, shelters, alternative schools, and entities such as Community Reach.
- <u>Summer Camp (TBD)</u> CBR plans future offerings of privately-funded summer camp opportunities without cost to eligible youth and families. PAC families will be included in these no cost offerings. Timing and development of this programming is TBD.
